Municipal Hall Insurance

So many inquiries have reached the Review regarding the operation of the Municipal Hall Insurance Act that it has been deemed advisable to give a synopsis so far as space permits.

The electors of the different municipalities have the privilege on February 27th, of saying whether they wish to adopt the Act or not.

Immediately following the voting a statement showing the result must be forwarded to the Minister, and in the event of forty-five or more municipal districts electing to come under the Act, the Minister may establish the municipal districts so electing "The Hall Insurance District."

After its organization, however, any of the hall insurance districts may, after the expiration of five years and by a by-law affirmed by the electors, withdraw from such hall insurance upon such terms as the Minister may deem just.

The board representing each district will comprise nine members, one member for each municipal district. Each member, other than the chairman, who will receive a fixed salary, will receive remuneration at the rate of eight dollars per day together with transportation and cost of subsistence.

Crop Report.

All owners or occupants of land liable to assessment under the Act must forward to the secretary of the municipal district previous to June 15th a return, showing the acreage of the land owned, nature of crops sown, and his intention if desired to reduce the rate to six dollars per acre.

Any owner can withdraw by giving notice previous to June 15th. Any person owning a crop which is damaged by hail between June 1st and September 15th, both inclusive or in the case of fall wheat and rye, between June 1st and September 15th, shall within three days of damage, give notice by registered letter to the hall insurance board at Calgary.

An adjuster will then be sent to inspect the crop. The maximum indemnity to be paid for total loss shall be eight dollars per acre.

From this, however, the board will deduct arrears for hall insurance tax together with ten per cent. of the total insurance earned until the proper rate is determined.

The rate for meeting expenses of administration, indemnities, etc., will be fixed by the board previous to September 15th, and each municipal district will be appraised at its proportionate share, when the assessment can then be made and dispatched to owners of land within the district.

By the Act the board is given power to borrow money to meet expenses, but all moneys must be deposited in a chartered bank in a trust fund to be styled "Hall Tax Trust Fund."

The Review has confined within the above essential points contained in the provisions of the Act, but should any of our readers require further information we will endeavor to supply them.

N. P. Rosenbick is having a sale of farm machinery and all stock Tuesday, February 18th, beginning at 10 o'clock.

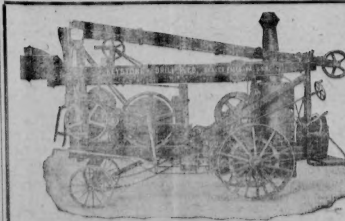
Mr. and Mrs. Jas. Larsen and W. O. Larson motored to Lethbridge Monday and visited at Grassy Lake on Tuesday.

Ango-American Understanding

Paris — Every day that passes increases the certainty that Britain and the United States have reached an agreement on all fundamental questions and are working closely together. Both nations have made concessions; Britain has accepted the U. S. views as to certain vital phases of the league of nations and the U. S. has surrendered to Britain with regard to the old contention regarding freedom of the seas says a U. S. press correspondent.

No regret should be wasted over this surrender for it was the weakest point in the American program. Their original conception grew out of the controversies first with Britain and then with Germany over the rights of neutrals. The United States claimed the privilege under the existing laws of trading freely with both sides; Britain contended that while these laws were applicable in former times they were not so in these times modern wars are fought, not between professional armies and navies, but between whole peoples. Everybody is a combatant and there is no certain area and therefore everything is contraband. The United States practically accepted this position when entering the war, they helped the allies to lighten the blockade.

The chief cause of the present concession to Britain is the realization that the day is indeed past when wars can be fought according to rules. The league of nations may be a failure in its phases; but when a great conflagration sweeps the world and the nations again plunge into the perils of life and death, all rules will be in vain for nobody will observe them. The real evil is not the breaking of war rules but the breaking of the moral code. Why, therefore, waste efforts in drafting rules which would be better expended towards preventing war altogether?

The best preventive plan yet suggested is the establishment of a league of nations. If a strong league with suitable limitations of armaments can be organized, the whole question of the freedom of the seas immediately becomes a dead issue. This reasoning may be considered the basis of the present warm Anglo-American understanding.

For Return of Kaiser

Paris — Field Marshal von Hindenburg, according to the Echo de Paris, is endeavoring to bring about the return of former Emperor William, after the meeting of the national assembly. Leading German manufacturers in Westphalia, are said to be interested in the plan. The newspaper adds that the former emperor would be treated as a guest in the country. Germany was assigned to him. Ebert is said to have replied that he has the national assembly would be qualified to decide the question.

Strike-Moving in Belfast

City by Night Is Now in Total Darkness — London — It is estimated that nearly 200,000 men and women are idle in the United Kingdom and Ireland because of strikes in various trades, creating one of the most serious situations industrially that the country has in many years. All of the strikers are in Belfast, where the strike movement is continuing to spread. In cases where such drastic action was not taken the people were forced by threats or even the use of force to return to their private homes. It is not considered safe to use more than one candle and the supply of candles is rapidly diminishing.

Consider Adriatic Question

With View to Determine Merits of Claims — Paris — A commission, consisting of four admirals representing Great Britain, the United States, France and Italy has been appointed to consider the Adriatic question. The commission is to be headed by Admiral Flourens, who is now in London. It is expected that the commission will report in a few days.

Troops Leave Germany

All Canadian Fighting Divisions are Now in Belgium — Ottawa — Confirmation of the statement that the third Canadian division, the first of the fighting divisions from Canada to be returned home, will probably sail from England about March 1, is contained in a cable from Sir Edward Keel, overseas minister of military affairs, to the militia headquarters. The cable also gives the exact location of all the Canadian fighting divisions and concludes that they are now in Belgium and not in Germany.

The first division, which is now at Huy midway between Liege and Namur, where it arrived from the front about ten days ago. The second division is located at Namur, having reached that place from the Rhine just about the time the cable was dispatched.

The third division is at Tournai, also in Belgium and is expected to begin the movement from there to England the second week of February, and from England to Canada about March 1. The fourth division is stationed at Nivelles, twenty-five miles south of Brussels. Certain corps troops, such as garrison artillery, cavalry and hospital units, will be able to return to England about the same time.

Say Allies Must Evacuate Russia

If They Desire to Prove Their Fitness to Act as Arbitrators — Paris — Further light on the Bolshevik attitude towards the invitation of the allied and associated powers to a conference with the Russian factions at Brno, is given by an article in the Bolshevik official newspaper Izvestia of January 26.

The article states, which was signed by M. N. Pokrovsky, the indirect character of the invitation, noting that it bore neither address nor signature. It also declares the allies must choose between the role of adversaries of the new Russia and that of arbitrators. If they desire to prove their fitness to act as arbitrators he insists they must completely evacuate Russia. Then their initiative, he adds, may be taken seriously.

Denies Megantic Story

Hullas — Officials of the White Star line have emphatically denied charges made by a number of the soldiers returning on the Megantic that conditions aboard the steamer were not all they should be. Hullas evening papers publish statements from Major Linton, the officer commanding the Megantic, setting forth that the food supplied was of good quality, that the accommodations for all was satisfactory and that the four quarters were kept in excellent condition.

Young Soldiers Will Watch Rhine

69 Battalions Will Be Sent Immediately to Release Old Men — London — The regulations governing the armies of occupation are dealt with in an official statement issued by Winston Spencer Churchill, secretary for war. The statement says:

"The British military commanders are of the opinion that the arrangements are sufficient for this transition period. All the rest will be demobilized as fast as possible."

"The new armies will begin forming February 1, and will be composed in the first instance, of those who have enlisted since January 1, 1916, and who do not exceed 37 years of age. Volunteers will be accepted for the first year from among men otherwise entitled to release, while 69 battalions of young soldiers now on home service will be sent immediately to guard the Rhine bridgeshead and the older men."

"The men of the new armies will be paid bonuses ranging from ten shillings and sixpence per week for privates, to forty-two shillings per month, in addition to the ordinary army pay. Leave will be granted on as generous a scale as possible."

"The object of the new army is the home army, the army of the Rhine, the army of the middle east, a detachment of the army of the crown colonies and India."

"These arrangements seem to be the best available for the year of 1919. During the year, however, we must make the old British regular army as strong as possible, by voluntary basis, overseas garrisons and foreign stations."

"In connection with the foregoing the ministry of labor announces that no further application for release of individual officers or men on pivotal special grants can be considered."

Opposes Annexation

President Wilson Wishes to Interdict the German Colonies — Paris — Financial considerations have entered largely into the discussion of internationalization of the German colonies, which have been generally regarded as the chief asset of Germany, in settling war claims.

When Japan has made it certain that she is willing to return the actual territory included in the Kiaochow concession to China, she desires to retain the German railways, mines and other valuable concessions in Shanghai province to reimburse her for war expenditures.

Australia has advanced a similar reason for claiming the New Guinea islands and New Zealand for claiming Samoa. It is asserted that the United States and Caroline groups are supported on the same grounds, and a similar reason is offered for the actual transfer of the German African colonies to members of the entente.

China naturally objects to having the concessions which have been taken over from her transferred to Japan in settlement of the war claims of any nation, while it is asserted that President Wilson opposes actual annexations and insist upon internationalization of all the Pacific and African German colonies. This and the internationalization plan, the entente powers are unable to see how their claims against Germany would be met and objection has been raised that if actual transfer of the colonies is not made to certain powers in settlement of war claims, the chief asset of Germany would be eliminated, as the nation to whose guardianship the colonies was entrusted by the league of nations could not consider them its property.

Italy Apologizes

Washington — Rear-Admiral Niblock, commanding American naval forces in the Adriatic, has advised the navy department that the action of the Italian authorities in handling the American flag on the steamer Dinara was due to a misunderstanding and that the Italian commander had apologized and ordered the flag restored.

Must Re-take Navra

Stockholm — Premier Lenine, according to a report from Revel, has ordered the Bolshevik troops to re-take the town of Navra. The town is situated within a week, to sack the town and to "kill all the bourgeoisie. Lenine is reported to be staying in the town of Yamburg, east of Navra."

German Army Mobilized

Paris — Two full corps of German troops have been assembled by the general staff in the vicinity of the Poles and eight troop trains are passing through Frankfort-on-the-Oder daily, according to a Zurich dispatch. The four quarters of the great Baden-Baden.

Buys Canada's Airplanes

American Will Inaugurate Aerial Service Throughout Canada — New York — The New York Sun says:

"Roy U. Conger, a nephew of Edwin H. Conger, United States minister to China at the time of the Boxer rebellion, gave his certified check to Joseph Flaville, representing the British ministry of munitions, and Director Morrow, of the imperial air board, and thereby became the owner of the entire aircraft equipment, costing more than \$10,000,000, which is provided for Great Britain and used by Canada in training Canadian air fliers."

"The transaction was closed at Toronto, and the job of assembling 50 airplanes, 700 airplane engines, millions of spare parts, thousands of spare propellers, wings, cameras and other equipment, was at once begun under the direction of F. G. Erickson, of Toronto, Mr. Conger's Canadian representative."

"The whole equipment will be moved from the Royal Flying Corps training fields at Armour Heights, near Montreal, Beauville, and Borden to the field at Leaside, the use of which, rent free, has been granted to the Conger by the British Dominion government."

"The price paid was not divulged at the request of the British government, and is the highest price of the original cost of the equipment."

"Mr. Conger's plans for the use and disposal of the stupendous equipment are chiefly in the making, and the greatest feature of them is the immediate development of airplane service for the use of the army and navy. He is fully convinced that heavier than air machines are to be the principal transporting medium and vehicles of the future for passengers, mail express, and, in time, indeed, for heavy freight, the New York press reports that the new department, regular commercial service by airplane between the principal Canadian cities. Capture of Perm Ended Reds' Reign

In Three Months Whole Population Would Have Perished — Omsk — Central Siberia — Death stalked the streets of Perm. The city was captured by General Gaidar, and the investigation who has just returned from the Ural front. So terrible were the conditions under the Bolshevik regime that the diamond from Perm have not yet recovered. It is said that the few pedestrians encountered were the frightened, wide-eyed and a constant nervous trembling of the head and hands. There are no children less than a year old in Perm, all having died just before the war, which adds that in three months the whole population would have perished if the Bolsheviks were not driven out of the city.

Peasants were forbidden last June to take provisions into their territory. Some people hid supplies, but these were found and seized by the Bolsheviks, who spread terror throughout the whole region near Perm.

More German Trickery

Faulty Knowledge of English Gives Scheme Away — Ottawa — Germany has just the war, but not its old time commercial success, is being sacrificed to advantage over from the director of public information, Fred James, official correspondent with the Dominion press wire from Bonn, Germany, as follows:

The Dominion representatives generally, though very reticent, are greatly perturbed."

"The Daily Mail cites Arabia and Mesopotamia as place where the possible inhabitants are capable of self-determination and would have their wishes put into effect by the league of nations."

"Regarding safeguards under which the 'B'atories would administer to the countries whose people are not ripe for self-determination, the Daily Mail says President Wilson proposes that the safeguards shall be settled by the peace conference or the league of nations. It is stated that the safeguards shall be set under this system, while formal advice is given to President Wilson's theory, the right of government by mandate is not to differ in effect from the British imperial conception. This view induced the imperial cabinet to accept President Wilson's plan, but an examination into the steps to be taken for putting it into effect already reveals the gravest difficulties."

Armistice Ended

Claims Will Be Prejudiced by Continuance of Violence — London — Commenting on the action of the supreme war council in issuing a warning to those who are using armed forces in Europe and the East to enlarge their possessions by force claims are finally adjusted, the Times says:

"The decisions of the conference will rest on two sets of considerations and two only. The first set is the result of the war that was terminated by the armistice of November 11. This armistice ended once and for all the struggle of the great east in international justice which is now open to Paris, to appeal to force is contempt of God."

"The second set of considerations is made up of claims of justice. Various rival nationalities who are now being treated by their claims are having back to back and definitely closed by the defeat of Germany, in which might was used to determine right. The great power in the conference, having at the cost of incredible exertions and sacrifices overthrown that old justice and set up a new tribunal of justice must accept their authority against all appeals by violence. We do not mean that all claims that are made by the victors are necessarily valid, but that in themselves are unjust. But just or not they will be prejudiced by a continuance of violence. He who asks for justice must come to court with clean hands."

Trouble in Holland

Suspected Strangers Under Police Supervision Will Be Interred — The Hague — Again threatened with revolution, several towns in Holland are taking measures to prevent government action. In Arnhem all the public buildings, post and telegraph offices are occupied by suspected revolutionaries. The Hague is known to be a centre of Bolshevik propaganda and suspected strangers who are under police supervision will probably be interned in a camp or on an island.

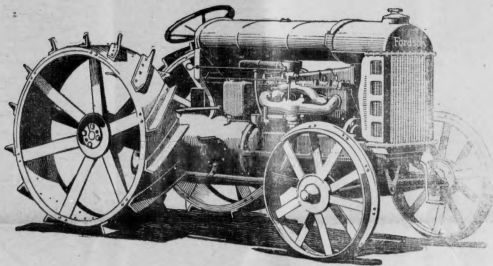

Legend tells us that the devil once appeared and tempted him, whereupon the holy prelate seized a pair of pinches and tweaked the nose of his satanic adversary so shamefully that he fled in howling dismay.

The St. Dunstan of today banishes with equal promptitude the devil of despair, hopelessness and apathy.

Altogether, it seems to be a singular freak of fortune that the house should long before it was inhabited, by the blind soldiers and sailors, have been given a name which has turned out to be so appropriate.

It is then in this home where our blinded heroes are taught to be ever cheerful, bright and happy amid their darkened surroundings that is breeding future world which will carry until every blinded soldier is fully trained and equipped for the future, and the after care department, needs help.
